# Message from the Headteacher

As I write, we are once again leaving behind (hopefully!) freezing temperatures, slippery surfaces and icy winds. I often wonder what members of our community who originate from colder climbs, think of our response to snow and extreme weather. On the one hand, it is wonderful that the children can enjoy the snow. You may have seen some of the pictures on our social network feeds of children being able to enjoy good old fashioned play. When snow is here, it is wonderful to see that it overtakes the electronic gadgets as the number one exciting play item! On the other hand, we do worry about members of our community who struggle in extreme weather, and what we can do to keep them safe. On this note, I would like to thank all members of staff, especially our site team and support staff, who went the extra mile in trudging round the building to make sure that the site was safe for all.

Speaking of extra miles, over the next few weeks, we are going to be launching the "Golden Mile". As you may be aware, primary schools have received some additional funding from the government to promote sport and physical activity for all. The children have already met coaches from our partners at "Premier Sport" who introduced the children to this. The children will be encouraged to complete laps in our playgrounds and fields which they can record on an online tracker. There will be prizes for individuals and classes as well as a chance to see how we are performing compared to local schools. The aim of this project is obviously to promote sport and physical activity in its simplest form and to ensure that our children develop good habits for life in relation to their physical activity, health and wellbeing.

This term, the school has also had an RE Interim Monitoring visit which looked at the quality of RE, Chaplaincy Provision and Catholic life. Whilst the report is yet to be published, our reviewer, Mrs Pat O'Byrne was impressed by the way in which our Catholicity permeates throughout all that we do, from the way in which children express their faith through their work in class, through to the way in which the Year of Prayer and Vocation is at the forefront of our whole-school prayer and worship. Mrs O'Byrne also gave us some valuable recommendations in relation to the way we could use the outdoor areas as prayer spaces and how we could ensure that our Catholic life continues to thrive as we look forward to our leadership developments.

On the subject of leadership development, I would like to thank so many of you who have sent me good wishes following my recent news. If I needed reminding as to how tough the decision was to leave, you all reminded me! The good will and generosity of spirit that you contribute to our school is extremely humbling and is something I will hold onto.

Lent has been a vibrant time for our school, as ever. We have had a number of charitable enterprises ranging from origami to cakes, from donating football boots to book marks. The children have written their own Lenten promises which have been added to our Lenten trees, both in classes and in displays around the school. What is particularly special about these is that they don't simply focus on what they should give up, but the extra things that they want to do to show their love for family and friends. In assemblies, the singing has been very special this season with the words of St Richard of Chichester (a focal point for our Year of Prayer and Worship) really epitomising what Lent is all about:

Thanks be to thee, my Lord Jesus Christ, for all the benefits thou hast given me, for all the pains and insults thou hast borne for me. O most merciful redeemer, friend and brother, may I know thee more clearly, love thee more dearly, and follow thee more nearly, day by day.

Amen.
